

HOBSON VILLAGE COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION MEETING MINUTES THURSDAY, MAY 14, 2015

<u>Attendees</u>: Alice Anderson, Andrea Marwah, Lisa Sachdev, Sarah Causemaker, Colleen Grills, John Pollitt, a concerned resident

Meeting was called to order at 7:41 p.m. by Lisa Sachdev.

A concerned resident addressed the Board with questions about the rights of neighbors and community with regards to renters who have engaged in criminal activity. Discussion ensued around homeowners' responsibility to those in the neighborhood when they rent out their property. Resident brought up Crime Free Housing Programs, which exist in other communities, as well as crime free lease addendums, which enable landlords the right to break leases if renters engage in illegal activity. He questioned whether we could include a crime free lease addendum in the bylaws.

Secretary (Colleen Grills): Last month's meeting minutes were approved by members of the board.

Treasurer (John Pollitt): As of the date of the meeting, seven residents have not paid dues. One paid assessment letter was sent out this month. The total cost for snow removal this season was \$440. The bill for liability insurance was \$1,527.

Landscaping (Jim Hill): (Report via email) The sprinkler system at the entrance on Olesen is up and running. The City installed the water meter, and Muellermist tested the system and repaired some damaged sprinkler heads. There was no charge for that, as it's considered normal wear and tear and is covered by our maintenance contract. There is some old fence lumber that someone piled up on the north side of the entrance. Jim thinks it actually belongs to Hobson Village, from a fence we had long ago, so he will take care of removing it when he cleans up the other brush on that side of the entrance. Brush pickup starts on June 8, so Jim will do the clean-up the weekend of June 6 and 7. Jim spoke with Tom Tuch of Home Landscape Materials, and the trees he ordered for Derby Park are in. Tom said they would plant them and do the other work in the park in the next few weeks. He also gave us a proposal to remove the shrubs around the parking lot and plant new ones. Jim attached the proposal as well as information about proposed plants for the Board to review. Tom's proposal for replacing 40 shrubs works out to about \$90 each. The total cost (\$3,600) is, however, more than the \$2,000 we had set aside in this year's budget. One alternative is to carry over the \$2,000 to next year, add \$1,600 to next year's budget, and do all the work next spring. Another alternative is to ask him for a quote to just remove the shrubs, which would hopefully fit our budget this year, and then we could organize some volunteers to plant a few perennials. Jim would like to move forward with the "neighbors helping neighbors" idea he e-mailed the Board members about earlier. He would be happy to coordinate the volunteers and recipients. The Board discussed the expense of landscaping of Derby Park and decided to table decision until next meeting.

Tennis (Sarah Causemaker): The tennis courts have been set up. Sarah received a query from a neighbor asking if there was a list of others who play tennis in the neighborhood. She will call the coach who had asked if he could use our courts for lessons. The board has voted against painting pickle ball lines on the tennis courts this year due to other priorities in Derby Park. A reminder to residents: the city of Naperville does not empty the trash in Derby Park. Please do not put pet waste in the trash bin in Derby Park! This trash bin is emptied by a resident of Hobson Village.

Social (Alice Anderson and Stephanie McDonald): The first TGIF of the season will be at the Malone's on May 15. We still need a host home for the June TGIF. We are looking for teenagers to work the bouncy house at the picnic in June. We are looking into games for older kids. This year at the picnic, we will have neighbors fill out name tags. Signs will be put out the Thursday before. Alice or Stephanie will get in touch with Brad about possible dates in August or September for a neighborhood Movie Night in Derby Park. Alice and Stephanie have received feedback from a few residents about a neighborhood garage sale. They are thinking about organizing this at the end of the summer or early fall. We still need to figure out a budget for a Fall Adult Social. Alice suggested a Ravinia-type event in Derby Park, where people bring seats and blankets and provide their own food and beverage.

Welcoming (Christine Thompson): Nothing new to report.

Bylaws/Directory (Kate Searcy): (via email) Kate has contacted Gabrielle (our lawyer) twice and is waiting to hear back. She will send another email soon. Kate is waiting for Gabrielle to draft a memo and discuss a timeline.

Architecture (Andrea Marwah): Andrea received one email from a resident regarding the fence building process.

Old Business: No old business.

New Business: The neighborhood Facebook Group page is up and running. Barb Ceruti will be asked to put a blurb in the newsletter about the new neighborhood Facebook Group page. Lisa suggested we table Jim Hill's idea of "neighbors helping neighbors" until next meeting.

Meeting was adjourned at 10:07 p.m. by Lisa Sachdev.
